Public Comments on Agenda Items

6. <u>C-6 SPEAKERS</u>

Minutes:

Dr. Barbara Ehren, Professor at the University of Central Florida, spoke in support of Our Children's Prep. She stated this organization is very unique because it integrates therapeutic services with curriculum. She asked that the Board Members consider

approving the charter application for Our Children's Prep.

Mr. Bryan Sherwin, a Member of the Provisional Board of Our Children's Prep, discussed some inconsistencies that were identified during the charter application process for that organization. He stated they understand there were a few errors in their budget presentation but the school has amassed \$1 million and has documented in excess of \$900,000 fund balance. Their board is staffed with business and finance people and they realize they must be able to mitigate risk. Much consideration has been given and they are prepared to do whatever it takes to get the school off the ground. He asked that the Board Members consider approving the charter application for Our Children's Prep.

Sharon Comkowycz, representing the Provisional Board Chair for Our Children's Prep, discussed the clerical inconsistencies in the charter application. She stated recent documentation received by their staff was not intended as additional information but merely intended as supporting documentation for the Board. She reiterated that Our Children's Prep is a unique and innovative model and she hopes the Board decides to embrace this concept because it would be a benefit to the children.

Larry Milhorn, President of the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) Local 2227, thanked the Superintendent and the Board for the opportunity to promote and increase salaries for those employee areas covered under the AFSCME Union and also for the time and consideration given to the negotiations required. He stated this is a small step but things are moving in the right direction.

Brian Warren, Acting Senior Director of Human Resources, discussed the changes for various positions in an effort to level the salary schedules. These changes were discussed at the School Board Work Session on September 22, 2015, and reflect 49 salary steps for non-union professional technical positions, 30 salary steps for district administrators, school-based principals, assistant principals and 43 salary steps for food service managers. These changes will reflect a 1% pay increase for all non- union professional technical staff, district office, and school based administrators, including newly hired employees. Staff members in professional technical positions who meet the criteria of one year in service will receive two salary steps on his or her pay

grade equal to a 3% pay increase.

Minutes:

Brian Warren, Acting Senior Director of Human Resources, discussed the ratification of the Collective Bargaining Agreement Changes reached between the Polk County School District and American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME). The collective bargaining changes for Bus Drivers and Bus Attendants will be a respective cost of \$630,468, and were ratified August 29, 2015. The collective bargaining changes for School Nutrition Assistants will be a respective cost of \$1,226, 979, and were ratified August 29, 2015. The collective bargaining changes for Custodial Maintenance, Vehicle Services will be a respective cost of \$1,090, 301, and were ratified September 26, 2015.

Mrs. Sellers thanked the District and the Union for their cooperative efforts.

Mr. Berryman commented that \$1.2 million for School Nutrition Positions are paid by Federal Funds.

Mr. Mullenax commented we are not able to pay these individuals what they deserve, but this is a step in the right direction.

Minutes:

Superintendent LeRoy commented on the extensive work done on the seven charter applications and the cooperative efforts of the evaluation committee and an outside consultant.

The Superintendent's recommendations were to approve the applications of:

- Discovery High School
- Montessori of Winter Haven
- Our Children's Academy in Lake Wales

The Superintendent's recommendations were to deny the applications of:

- Bridge Prep Academy
- Joint Service Military Academy
- Lakeland Institute for Learning
- Our Children's Prep in Winter Haven

Discovery High School:

Mr. Harris commented in regard to Discovery High School, that from a business perspective it would not be feasible to accommodate a charter school in the North area of the county when there are so many open seats in the existing public schools in that area. Because of this, he plans to vote against this charter application.

Mr. Berryman commented on Discovery High School in regard to the denial of their application last year, but this year they have corrected those deficiencies in their application. Because of this, he plans to vote in favor of approving this charter application.

Mrs. Fields stated she was not aware there were schools with empty seats.

Mr. Harris explained there are three schools in the north end of Polk County, including Tenoroc High School, that do not have full enrollment. Adding another school in that area will only create additional problems with schools that are under-capacity.

Mr. Mullenax commented he voted against this charter application last year for several reasons; however, he believes the inconsistencies have been corrected and he plans to vote in favor of approving this charter application.

Montessori of Winter Haven:

Mr. Mullenax commented the representatives from Montessori of Winter Haven have put forth a great deal of effort to ensure their charter application was free of errors or omissions.

New Beginnings High School:

Mrs. Fields commended New Beginnings High School for recognizing their inconsistencies and withdrawing their application. She stated she looks forward to them correcting their deficiencies and reapplying in the future.

Our Children's Prep of Winter Haven:

Mr. Wilson commended the Charter Review Committee for reviewing and vetting all of the charter applications and the Multiple Pathways team for facilitating the process. He reflected on his years spent teaching and discussed the correlation between students performing well in school and being successful in society. This model has been very successful in the Lake Wales community and has been of tremendous value and benefit to that area as well. He commented this application was not as fully developed as it should have been and it is unfortunate that the application was not successful in conveying its worth to the Charter Review Committee. He stated it is his opinion that this organization would be a valuable addition to Polk County and the citizens of Winter Haven and would be very successful. Because of this, he plans to vote in favor of their application.

Mrs. Sellers stated there are processes in place for a reason, and although Our Children's Prep would be an asset to Polk County, these processes must be adhered to. She commented that everyone must be treated fairly and equitably and held to the same standard. She encouraged this organization to follow up to remove any deficiencies in their application and apply again next year. Although revisions were sent to the Board, they were received after the deadline and per State Statute they are no longer acceptable. Because of their insufficiencies, she plans to vote against their application this year.

Mr. Berryman encouraged Our Children's Prep to return next year and resubmit their application after working with the District to alleviate deficiencies that were encountered this year. He commended them on their staff and organization; however, he plans to vote against their application at this time.

Mrs. Fields commented Our Children's Prep has great value and would fill a tremendous need in the community. She reflected on similar issues Montessori School encountered last year with their application but they followed through by coordinating with School District Staff to alleviate those issues. She encouraged Our Children's Prep to work with the School District and reapply next year. She plans to vote against this application.

Mrs. Cunningham stated that Our Children's Prep is run by a great group of individuals and is a system that has already been proven in the Lake Wales community. Although there is a great need for the services they provide, there is a process that must be followed. The application had a few strengths but there were quite a few application concerns that were not limited to just miscalculation errors on the budgeting side. Some of these concerns were: discrepancies in target student population, curriculum issues, financial concerns, and no identification of core subject areas. She plans to vote against this application.

Mr. Harris asked Legal Counsel if there was State Statute that deals with private schools applying to be a charter school.

Wes Bridges, Counsel for the Board, commented that a private school is not eligible to apply to be a charter school. In this instance, Our Children's Prep identified themselves as a McKay school, but only public and private schools can offer this. The existing school appears to be a private school; however, it has been suggested the private school will continue to operate alongside the charter if the application is approved. This does raise some question as to their intentions and the conflict with Statute.

Mr. Bridges commented to the Board that he will work with Melissa Brady, Director of Charter Schools, to ensure the letters indicating denial are sent to the entities within the ten-day statutory limit.

Mr. Berryman discussed with Counsel the approval of Discovery Academy's charter application and how this effects the pending litigation with this organization. He stated it might be financially prudent to consider dropping that appeal.

Mr. Bridges stated this will be addressed at length in the Attorney's Report.

Superintendent's Report

52. Superintendent's Report

Minutes:

The Superintendent shared a presentation regarding test results recently released for the Florida Standards Assessment. She commented that Polk County students have made learning gains in most areas including Math in all testing levels, and English. In Math, Polk County School District's state rankings have improved as many as eleven steps. In English, Polk County School District's state rankings have improved as many as twelve steps. She also explained the development of cut scores.

The Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) is on a different scale and new achievement levels have not been approved. A percentile rank tells you what percent of other students in the state of Florida earned the same or lower score on the test. A T-score is another way of reporting percentile rank. The mean T-score, or midpoint T-score, is 50. This means that a student who earns a T-score of 50 scored better than half of the students in the state who took the test and scored lower than half of the students in the state who took the test. However, comparisons such as district rankings and estimated 2013-14 equivalent achievement levels are possible. Rankings for 2014 were based on mean scale score. Rankings for 2015 were based on mean T-score. Polk was compared to all districts in the state and 10 contiguous districts.

The Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) released quartiles; however, inferences based on quartiles are difficult to make because we do not have that information from prior years. Quartiles contain students scoring in multiple achievement levels. Achievement Levels for the FSA have not been approved.

Final 14-15 achievement levels are expected to be more difficult than 13-14 levels. Recommended cut scores for achievement levels will be presented to the State Board of Education for adoption in December. Because 2014-15 is the first year of FSA administration, learning gains are not being measured this year. In prior years, learning gains allowed school districts to show progress being made by students, even if the student did not achieve an on-grade-level/proficient score (achievement level 3). As more information is made available, it will be shared with the public.

Superintendent LeRoy expressed her appreciation to teachers and staff as well as leadership teams as this work is done in every classroom across Polk County. She also stated that the results indicate we are moving in the right direction.

There is one meeting of the School Board during the months of November, December, and January.

The next work session will be at 12:30 PM on Tuesday, November 10, 2015 in the Superintendent's Conference Room followed by the School Board Meeting at 5:00 PM in the auditorium located at 1915 S. Floral Avenue, Bartow.

Mr. Mullenax commented the Stepping Out for Education event sponsored by the Polk Education Foundation (PEF) raised approximately \$70,000. He also stated this is a very enjoyable event and PEF has taken this idea and expounded on it to great ends.

60. Kay Fields, District 5

Minutes:

Mrs. Fields attended the recent event to name the Kathleen High School Administrative Building in memory of Dr. Clint Wright on September 20. This was a well attended event by School Board Members, Community Leaders, and Polk County School District Staff Members as well as many appreciative family members of Dr. Wright. She commended the efforts of the Community Relations Department and their innovative use of advertising and social media to reach the public and enhance participation in this event that honors the legacy he left behind.

61. Lynn Wilson, District 6

Minutes:

Mr. Wilson commented that all of the Board Items that are voted on are thoroughly vetted, discussed, and debated during the School Board Work Sessions which are open to the public.

He also commented on his recent attendance at Stepping Out for Education sponsored by the Polk Education Foundation. This was a very enjoyable and well attended event.

Public Comments Addressing Items Not on Agenda

63. SPEAKERS

Minutes:

Amanda Lipham, who is a parent of a Valleyview Elementary School student, discussed the petition for school recess that she initiated. She has amassed over 2,000 signatures of individuals advocating 20 minutes of recess daily. It is her opinion that recess would encourage enthusiasm for education and diminish frustration for students.

Cynthia Tann, a former Polk County School District teacher, stated daily unstructured outdoor breaks are important to expend energy. It promotes better focus in the classroom and better cognitive performance. Recess promotes health and social development as well.

Christy Shinifield, a Middle School Science Teacher and parent, stated research shows recess allows for better social skills and promotes cognitive skills.

Jeff Shinifield commented on the benefits recess time could afford teachers. Recess gives them an opportunity to recharge during the course of the day.

Dr. Wendy Bradshaw, an Exceptional Student Education (ESE) teacher at R. Bruce Wagoner Elementary, produced documentation regarding recess benefits during the school day. She also commented that unstructured physical play spent with peers allows for common ground and promotes socialization. She also discussed research that indicates recess is internationally recognized.

Lee Putnam, former Physical Education (P.E.) instructor in Polk County, stated recess allows students an opportunity to excel in something that is not mentally taxing which may in fact be their strong suit.

Kimberly Noble, parent of a student attending Southwest Elementary, stated she had communicated last year via email with the School Board. The responses she received referenced state mandated curriculum time requirements for each subject as justification for lack of recess. She commented she has received an email from the State Board of Education that she feels is contradictory to this, which states only Language Arts has a mandated time requirement. She referenced School Board Policies and By-laws relating to physical education.

Jennifer Saban, joined by her child, referenced daily P.E. and daily recess for Kindergartners who attend Lincoln Academy Magnet School. It is her opinion that all students in all grades should have those opportunities.

Superintendent LeRoy discussed her plan to schedule a school-based meeting where this issue can be discussed with parents in an effort to promote best practices. She also presented some information gathered from a recent survey which shows 79% of Polk County elementary schools offer recess, some of which are daily. This has been a school based decision. She also commented on Florida Department of Education requirements that mandate 300+ minutes of uninterrupted instructional time for reading and writing, but instructional time is addressed in other instructional areas as well. We are also required to offer 150 minutes of P.E. This issue will be brought to a work session for discussion.

Mrs. Fields commented the School Board is open to discussion and she hopes this will be researched and addressed equitably.

Marianne Capoziello, President of the Polk Education Association (PEA), thanked the parents that took the time to come forward with their concerns. She also discussed:

- Legal ramifications and legal options associated with the test validation.
- How the Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) will effect not only the district grade but teacher evaluations and performance pay.
- No meaningful salary negotiations have been accomplished for teacher salaries.

Victor Chandler, of Eagle Lake, discussed teacher pay increases and presented a financial projection that illustrates teacher pay steps.

L.D. Wilcox stated we must place the well being of the children first and we cannot lead from behind. Concepts such as nepotism and buddyism must be abolished. The students deserve the best possible education.

Addison Brown stated discipline is an orderly structure that will help students be more receptive to learning. Civil citations are methods of conflict resolution created to deter young people from incarceration.

Keith Ward, Vice President of the Lakeland Branch of NAACP, discussed methods to invoke change. He then discussed the benefits associated with unstructured free time and

play time.

Mrs. Fields discussed methods of information sharing, such as Board Meetings and attendance at Work Sessions. These are some examples of how change takes place in the School District. It is important to bring issues to the Board and allow time for the information to be absorbed and discussed. The ultimate goal is the best interest of the students. She stated the process of civil citation should be researched and a future work session item should address the benefits of this practice.

Superintendent LeRoy commented that civil citations must be discussed with law enforcement and the State Attorney's Office.

Mr. Mullenax commented the subject of civil citations has been discussed in the past but it is a process with multiple agencies involved. He also explained how School Board Work Session items for discussion are initiated.

Mr. Berryman agreed it is important to encourage dialogue from the public. He also commented on the importance of public attendance and participation in Board Meetings in order to invoke change. He discussed the approachability of all Board Members and commented on the Superintendent's consistent efforts to be transparent in all aspects.

Mrs. Sellers expressed her foreknowledge of the recess petition because it originated in her district. The Sunshine Laws forbid discussions between Board Members outside of structured meetings, therefore she could not bring this to their attention prior to the Board Meeting. She commended the School District for its quick response to public concerns.

Mr. Harris discussed his admiration of parents and community members for coming out to support subjects they feel passionate about. He commented on the need to form an alliance with parents and address issues with the Legislature in an effort to remove some of the pressure placed on students.
